### Where did you go to school?

"I was born outside of Chicago and grew up on the coast of Lake Michigan, so I am a mid-westerner at heart and love being by water. When I moved to Colorado I was thrilled to discover that snow is basically frozen water, so I get my water fix through snowboarding. I earned my BFA in digital art at the University of Colorado Boulder and my MFA in Computing and the Arts from the University of California, San Diego. After grad school, I was offered a teaching position back at the University of Colorado Boulder and I jumped at the opportunity. While at CU, I was a program director for many years, designed a new major and minor (Creative Technology and Design in the ATLAS institute), and created a handful of courses that explore the intersection art and technology."

#### What is your creative process?

"Given my interest in language, my creative process is fueled by reading and looking at language within the world. I'm equally inspired by French post-structural theory as I am road signs. When I get an idea for a project I will do a quick sketch or mock something up in Photoshop and pin it to my studio wall. Sometimes those ideas will resolve themselves quickly into a finished concept. Other times they will wait and 'bake' on the wall for years. My studio is like a snapshot of the inside of my brain, but I get ideas for work by being out in the world."

### What was the thought behind the YOURS installation?

"I was approached by Cortney Stell of Black Cube Nomadic Museum and the Downtown Denver Partnership to do an installation in an alleyway as part of their Happy Cities initiative. I really like doing installations in unique places because the context and location become such an integral and active part of the work. For this piece I was interested in alleyways as liminal places. Who really owns alleys? Who feels comfortable there? I wanted to make a light based work that would illuminate and question the idea of ownership in these spaces. I love working with propouns because many of them are the same word with a letter or two added to create their opposite (YOURS/OURS, HERE/ THERE, HE/SHE). I hope this piece makes people think about alleyways as public spaces, but also about the role that language plays in creating ideas of ownership and territory."

# What is your advice for aspiring artists?

"Being an artist is a difficult career choice. You are constantly putting your work out there and artists inevitably deal with a lot of rejection. My advice for aspiring artists is to fall in love with the practice of making art. If at the end of the day you still love making art, then you are succeeding. Highs and lows will come and go, but we have to love the act of making art first and foremost." **DIM**
